

One day I saw a little frog


Going hop, hop, hop.

8. Rhyming Activity






Numeracy

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5. Linear Measurement

Tall, short, tall, short.








What do you think this poem is about? Why do you think that?

Make two areas and label one long and one short. Sort your objects into which group they belong in. How did you decide which group to put them in? How can you figure out which is longer?






Find objects at home to build with. (Blocks, Lego, cardboard tubes, rocks, cans etc.)

Build two different towers with your items. Which of your towers is taller? How do you know?

Which of your towers is wider? How do you know?



Find objects to help you measure. (craft sticks, linking cubes, crayons etc.)

Find a long toy or object that would work for measuring. (Train, table, rug etc.)

Using the measuring materials, find out how long the object you are measuring is. Using the same measuring tools, compare another object to see how they compare for length. (E.g. The table is 10 crayons long AND the train is 5 crayons long).

6. Activity: Using the caterpillar measuring stick, measure things around the house or the items on the sheet if you have them. Have your child guess (estimate) first how many caterpillars long the item may be. After guessing have them measure the item.
